

A YOUNG MASON REMEMBERS BRO. LLOYD A. CUNDY P.M. H.D.S.G.W, P.D.J.G.W., P.D.D.O.C.

Bro. Lloyd A. Cundy P.M. was initiated into freemasonry on the 9th of May, 1973, passed to the degree of Fellow of Craft on the 11th of July, 1973 and raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason on the 14th of November 1973. He attained the degree of Mark Master Mason on the 12th of November, 1975 and became master of The Glenlyon Lodge in December 1981, eight years after being initiated. That is the well known part of his official Masonic record. But the man, the brother as I came to now him was so much more.

I first met "Bro. Cundy" as he was affectionately called, when I was a prospect for membership in Freemasonry. Like many young men who sought admission into the hallowed order he looked upon I me with a suspect eye. I will never forget that gravelly but clear and authoritarian voice asking me those insightful and penetrating questions in a tone of a stern yet benevolent father. Even after my initiation he carefully monitored my actions, activities and performance in the Lodge, making recommendations doling out advice. It was this advice that allowed me to navigate my first masonic steps with success. Even after my raising, he would still take me aside, advise me what and where I went wrong, advising me what steps to take to ensure the necessary corrective action in a tone that now became familiar and even welcome. In the years since, our relationship has grown much to our mutual benefit, and has graduated from that of a passing acquaintance to one of friendship. This typically took the form of an older wiser brother who would guide and instruct the younger less experienced but eager one. I would come to appreciate his sage advice, his profound intellect, his devotion to freemasonry and his incredible dry wit. His intellect was always tempered by sincerity and his devotion to those who he considered his friends. He was a man of letters and eloquence and had a love and knowledge of literature that was nothing short of impressive.





"Freemasonry - Into the Light" - Part II

Presented By the Right Worshipful District Grand Master Bro. Lloyd R. Moore

(A Lecture presented at the annual Whitsun McDonald Lecture - July 8, 2009)

On the fourth door these words are inscribed:

Is Freemasonry a secret society or a society with secrets? "Is there a secret about where we are going?"

Most authors disavow that we are a secret society but accept that we do have some secrets. The most impressive, however, is to be found in the preface to Bridge to Light by Rex Hutchins. He says: "Rather than being a secret society, Freemasonry is a revealer of secrets. The great truths of ancient man were, in their time, also great secrets and few were admitted into the sanctuaries where these truths were taught. Today the Craft teaches these great truths to all worthy men who ask to learn them".

Refuting Freemasonry as a secret society he justifies its secrecy at the same time. Does the lure of our Order resides is that some, within and without, persist in the thought that we are indeed a Secret Society?

Some are even possessed of the view that there is something more; some deeper secrets to be revealed and become sorely disappointed as degree after degree fail to uncover them. "Do the elusive secrets hide in the darkness of the degrees yet to come to light?" they impatiently ask.

Hutchins says "few were admitted into the sanctuaries where these truths were taught". Are these words "self-serving?"

We seek comfort in the conviction that: "It is the solemn duty of man to dedicate himself to the preservation of the body, the enlightenment of the spirit and the redemption of the soul." For though each must take his own path and open each door as his intellect allows, he will finally be subdued by the reality that, "There is nothing magical or mysterious in or about our rituals; all of its teachings are of an esoteric nature, urging us on to find the deeper TRUTH, the mystery of the TRIUNE MAN and the discovery of SELF".

"Indeed, there may be no secret at all about where we are ought to be going!" The fifth and final door questions:

What is the principal role of Freemasonry? "How much light do we need to see it?" As we embark on this final leg of the journey, allow me to remind you that William Hammond in his book What Masonry means, wrote:

"Many eons have passed since the first appearance of physical light and the founding of modern speculative Masonry, and the world still remains in darkness, to wit, the darkness of ignorance"

Doubtless, Freemasonry is an institution dedicated to the inculcation of great moral truths. But how does it impart its wisdom to the 'good men' eager to learn?

Is Hutchins credible when he claims that 'Today the Craft teaches these great truths to all worthy men who ask to learn them?'

Some insist that this teaching begins when **good men**, are brought into the light at the beginning of the long journey through the corridors of knowledge; amply illustrated by Sellery's **Entered the light:**

"The way was dark no light I could discern, I know not whether east or west I went, I did not even know the road would turn, But I on seeing light was solely bent."

What a joy it will be when our initiates seek the light of Masonry from **a genuine** desire for knowledge, instead of the **general desire** of which our rituals speak; for knowledge aids that understanding from which flows friendship and concord. Listen to these few lines by Nixon Waterman:

"If I knew you and you knew me,
If both of us could clearly see,
And with an inner sight divine
The meaning of your heart and mine,
I'm sure that we would differ less
And clasp our hands in friendliness;
Our thoughts would pleasantly agree
If I knew you and you knew me."

These lines inform the cordial relationship between each of us as Masons and the three Constitutions in Jamaica. The better 'to know each other'; to understand each other, and 'to ensure mutual respect' as we hold hands in repudiating the outside world's misguided view of us. Nothing is more important as we pass the mantle to younger brethren.

As we look to a future marked with unusual dynamism let us recall that no reaching back to the past will do anything to still movements that are greater than us for as one we must be at last. No cultural divide will do. No silence will do...for it will not last... what will be, will be at last. It is 'less than laudable' that in all the centuries past, Jamaican Freemasonry seems hardly to have moved 'into the light'. No charted course; opening door after door; alas finding no light behind each... Not the light of self discovery, self mastery or self spending. The principal role of Freemasonry must be to guide us to self knowledge and mastery and to aid us to find Spiritual Light for the more spiritual light we find the less material

As Newton said:

"Here lies the great secrets of Freemasonry... that it makes a man aware of that Divinity within him, wherefrom his whole life takes its beauty and meaning and inspires him to follow and obey it: making his existence a process of self-discovery, self-mastery and self-spending."

Our sun is just rising and we have yet to find the self that we seek. Finding him, we hope, will awaken that dormant yet Great Spirit of freedom that lies dormant within us.

King Solomon said: "Wisdom is the principal thing; therefore, get wisdom; and with all thy getting get understanding."

I cannot overstress that we need the blessing of the light of Divine Wisdom to chart our course and then an abundance of Masonic light to guide our understanding for "Many eons have passed since the first appearance of physical light and the founding of modern speculative Masonry, and yet the world still remains in darkness, to wit, the darkness of ignorance"

"Brethren, I enjoin you to each seek wisdom but get also understanding. Be generous to your neighbour and revere God as you 'build a temple of character that will outlast time and death' for your light must never be dimmed but shine as bright as that from the mariner's lighthouse for all to see and to emulate. Above all **listen** to the **light** of your Brethren for he who cannot speak may yet resist being a slave *for he shines even in the darkness of the day."*


